Does Joseph Brant think the colonists should revolt against Great Britain?

Text Support

The Native Americans have an attachment to the British king.

The Native Six Nations are troubled by stories they are hearing.

Many Indian warriors were killed in a battle where they defended their land against the colonists because the British soldiers didn't help them. They just sat back at home.

The king's subjects are cheating the Native Americans out of land when they already have so much that they've paid so little for.

Author's Perspective: Joseph Brant swears allegiance to the king of England but is not very happy with him.
