## Text Support

He tells all men that are able to carry a weapon to join. If they do not, they will be looked upon as traitors.

He offers freedom to any slave or indentured servant that joins.

Lord Dunmore proclaims that anyone who does not support the British in this revolution is committing treason and is a traitor to his country, Great Britain. Lord Dunmore does not agree with the colonists' revolt as he is building an army against them.
